**Rob Atkinson** is a Professor in the Cities Research Centre, University of the West of England, Bristol. His research interests are primarily concerned with cross-national work on Urban regeneration, Urban governance, and community Participation in Urban regeneration partnerships, urban Social exclusion and European urban and spatial policy. He is editor of the journal *Urban Research and Practice*. Currently he is involved in two EU Framework 6 projects: Governance for Sustainability and Urban Matrix, the latter is a knowledge dissemination platform designed to support local authorities in the development and implementation of policies on Sustainable urban development.

**Nunzia Borrelli** has a degree in Sociology from the University of Naples – Federico II, Italy, in 1999, with a Thesis on Urban Anthropology. **Stuart Farthing** is currently Principal lecturer in Urban planning in the Department of Planning and Architecture at the University of the West of England, Bristol. Having graduated in 1970 from the University of Nottingham, he undertook research at the University of Manchester, and gained a PhD under Peter Hall at the University of Reading.
